Updates from Washington

EPA has indicated that the next Environmental Workforce Development and Job Training Grant Request for Proposals (RFP) will be released late December or early January. It's time to begin preparations for responding to the RFP.

A new PLC Cycle will begin on January 9, 2013. Every two weeks, we will discuss critical issues that address the development and implementation of sustainable environmental workforce development programs.

We will keep PLC members informed with updates from Washington.

Workforce program development - planning activities that must start early

Three program development activities that can only be accomplished over time, and should be considered by organizations interested in starting an environmental workforce development program. These activities include:

- 1. Community assessment and characterization
- 2. Program awareness and outreach to potential stakeholders
- 3. Partner selection and recruitment

We will discuss each of these activities in detail in future PLC sessions. They form a foundation for sustainable workforce development programs. Without sufficient attention to these activities, subsequent activities will remain challenged.

Activities that must start early

It is important that those interested in federal assistance contact their EPA Workforce Development Regional Coordinator. Each of the ten EPA Regions has staff specifically assigned to work with community environmental workforce development programs. EPA Regional Coordinators can and are interested in working with you and your specific community issues. NOTE: EPA Regional Coordinators can only work with you until the RPF is issued and after awards are made. During the period from RFP issuance until awards, EPA staff are not allowed to work with individual communities. Guidance may only be provided as RFP clarification.

For this reason, it is important that you make contact with your Regional Job Training Coordinator before the RFP is issued. Even if organizations are uncertain that they will pursue a job training program, Regional Coordinators can provide helpful information and provide direction to those who may enhance program development. Regional Coordinators like to know who is active in their region. They can be a "best friend" and a link to EPA during program planning as well as program implementation. Many thanks to Lena Miller from Hunters Point Family (HPF) for her description of conditions and events that resulted in developing an environmental workforce development and training grant proposal in their community. Hunters Point provides a case study for selecting sites best suited for environmental Justice and Environmental Workforce Development and Training Programs. Bayview Hunters Point is an amplified version of community degradation, disenfranchisement, and redevelopment that occurs across the U.S. As Lena and her staff created their workforce development plan, they did an excellent job in reaching out to the community, assessing existing programs, and recruiting and selecting working partners. Each of the three major activities that form the foundation of sustainable workforce development programs was addressed.

Key partners include the San Francisco Office of Economic and Workforce Development, San Francisco City College-Southeast Campus, Young Community Developers, Northern California District Council of Laborers, and San Francisco Public Utilities Commission. Careful consideration was taken into account when identifying and selecting working community partners. Their proposal was funded during the last cycle, and they are beginning implementation of their new program.

Grant Opportunities

Brownfields Area-Wide Planning Grants were due November 30. Check to see if your community submitted a proposal. RFP guidelines are posted at http://www.epa.gov/brownfields/applicat.htm.

Assessment, Revolving Loan Fund, and Cleanup Grants were due November 19. RFP guidelines are posted at http://www.epa.gov/swerosps/bf/applicat.htm. Call the Mayor's office or office of economic development to see if a proposal has been submitted. Partner and coordinate early. This effort is an excellent start in developing a stakeholder network. Let them know you are thinking about an environmental workforce job development and training program, and ask them to be a partner.

2013 Environmental Justice Small Grants. EPA announced that it is seeking applicants for a total of \$1.5 million in environmental justice small grants to be awarded in 2013. EPA's environmental justice efforts aim to ensure equal environmental and health protections for all Americans, regardless of race or socioeconomic status. The grants enable non-profit organizations to conduct research, <u>provide education</u>, and develop solutions to local health and environmental issues in communities overburdened by harmful pollution. Grants are available for up to \$30,000 each. The 2013 grant solicitation is now open and will close on Jan. 7, 2013. Applicants must be incorporated non-profits or tribal organizations working to educate, empower, and enable their communities to understand and address local environmental and public health issues. EPA will host four pre-application teleconference calls on Dec. 1, 2012; and Dec. 13, 2012 to help applicants understand the requirements.

National Fish and Wildlife Foundation Urban Waters Grants. The multi-agency Urban Waters Restoration Program provides financial assistance to local partnerships for restoration with a focus on urban waters and watersheds. Approximately \$1,500,000 is available. Competitive projects will focus on education and training, outdoor recreation, monitoring, storm water management or urban forest restoration. Applications are due by February 7, 2013. Note: this program has one application through the NFWF Easygrants system for all program elements and all sources of funding. Applications can be accessed at www.nfwf.org/easygrants.

Strong Cities, Strong Communities Funding. The Strong Cities, Strong Communities initiative, first announced in July 2011, seeks to strengthen neighborhoods, towns, cities, and regions by enhancing the capacity of local governments to develop and execute their economic strategies, providing technical assistance and federal agency expertise, and creating new partnerships.
