# **FY20 Environmental Workforce Development and Job Training Grants**

We are now in a quiet period. EWDJT grant awards can be announced at any time. Most likely, announcements will be made in late October or early November. HMTRI will keep everyone posted as information becomes available.

### **HMTRI News:**

This year's All-Grantee meeting will be held the day before the 2019 National Brownfields Conference begins. All-grantee meeting participants should expect a full day event, so please schedule a travel day on December 9<sup>th</sup>. Better yet, schedule flights to arrive early on the 9<sup>th</sup>, allowing you to register for the National Conference on Monday. HMTRI will be covering hotel costs to attend the All-Grantee Meeting (two nights - Monday, and Tuesday) through a master contract we have set up with the Sheraton Grand Los Angeles. To avoid being charged for the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>, you must book your hotel per the instructions below. # 3. LEVERAGING AND STUSTAINABILITY

# This week's guest - Ken Alexander - RecycleForce, Indianapolis, IN

Thanks Ken for the great presentation and the good work you are doing in the City of Indianapolis. For the past two sessions, the Professional Learning Community has been discussing leveraging and sustainability strategies. Recycleforce provides a model not only for leveraging and program sustainability but also for many of the other objectives EWDJT promotes. Today Ken Alexander discussed the Recycleforce public/private social enterprise and strategies they use that provide transitional training to ex-offenders with nowhere else to go. Here is a summary of his presentation.

# Working with ex-offenders and breaking down the barriers to employment

"RecycleForce provides jobs, opportunities and a future to those who have made mistakes but want to live a better life". Ex-offenders have the odds stacked against them upon their release. Most have no job and no home to return to. Without these foundational elements, the rate of reoffending and returning to the criminal justice system is incredibly high—up to 50% in Indianapolis/Marion County. Recycleforce can get that rate down to 17%. With over 100 high risk participants, Recycleforce uses personal mentoring, purposeful work, training, and employer partnering to overcome barriers to employment.

### **Community service**

Recycleforce is the last best chance for ex-offenders in Indianapolis. As a social enterprise, Recycleforce deconstructs, transports, stores, and recycles over 12 million pounds of hazardous an solid waste annually. A quote from the Indianapolis Monthly summarizes their community service. # Social enterprise partnerships

Since 2006, RecycleForce has employed nearly 1200 men and women, providing industry-recognized training and certification, on-the-job training, and job placement services. RecycleForce employees also have access to and participate in:

- professional and peer mentoring
- high school equivalency and literacy tutoring
- assistance with housing and driver's license reinstatement
- substance abuse and mental health counseling
- tax preparation, budgeting, and financial literacy training.

In a social enterprise partnership, each entity contributes to the effectiveness, stability and sustainability of the other resulting in a stronger combination than either could be individually.

### Recruitment and screening

RecycleForce relies heavily on referrals from social service partners to screen and recommend prospective participants for entry into the program. As much as possible, almost all referrals are considered for the program. In some cases, referrals may enter into employment at RecycleForce but not initially enter the training program. Over the past eleven years, Ken can recall less than six participants who have been "kicked" out of the program. As he notes, "there is nowhere else to go".

## Teambuilding, student services, retention, and mentoring

Recycleforce is heavily dependent on peer-to-peer mentoring. Every morning, participants form a circle (youngest to oldest). Elders mentor and guide younger less experienced team members, providing encouragement and support during and outside organized activities. While program participants have case workers and parole officers including court directed mandates, mentors have the greatest influence on retention. RecycleForce also works with Trusted Mentors, 5/3 Bank, a local nonprofit providing citywide mentoring volunteers. Peer-to-peer training, coaching, and encouragement form the foundation for student retention. Over the top community and partner support provide additional student aid, support, and assistance.

# **Technical training**

The core training program includes 200 hours of technical instruction. Concurrent with their employment, Recycleforce employees are given an opportunity to participate in certification training that qualifies them for promotion within the organization or opportunities for outside work. Here are the types of certifications available to Recycleforce participants:

- 40-hour HAZWOPER
- Forklift safety
- Emergency action plan and fire prevention
- RCRA (HAZCOM and global SDS)
- OSHA safety (personal protective equipment)
- Warehouse safety
- Material handling
- Machine guarding
- Lockout tagout and OTI
- Basic first aid
- Blood borne pathogens
- Slips, trips, and falls

## **Life Skills Training**

RecycleForce helps ex-offenders break down the barriers to employment by providing transitional jobs for up to six months, as well as comprehensive services designed to get their lives back on track. Applicants to the program begin a meaningful job at \$9.25/ hour with opportunities for advancement. The RecycleForce model offers program participants an integrated focus on jobs skills, character development, and personal counseling. This "wrap-around" approach greatly increases the chance of sustained future employment and decreases the instances of re-offending.

# Graduate placement and tracking and facilitating successful transitions

Employers selecting program participants for employment opportunities include social service agencies, municipalities, RecycleForce customers and partners, direct employment as part of the RecycleForce

workforce, construction, and temp and manpower firms. Here are examples of jobs that have been filled by Recycleforce participants:

- Recycling, sorting and classification technician
- Hazardous waste handler
- Spill and emergency responder
- Deconstruction (electronic, mechanical, and structural)
- Landfill operator
- Flagger
- Solid Waste Management and Remediation
- Urban Agriculture/Composting
- Flagger certification
- Solid waste remediation Technician
- Material handling including forklift operator
- Solid waste disposal technician
- Lead or asbestos worker

The RecycleForce program extends well beyond the six-month transitional job opportunity. By working with industry partners and employers committed to hiring ex-offenders, RecycleForce helps facilitate the transition for program participants from temporary work to full-time, gainful employment.

### Leveraging grants and foundation funding

RecycleForce's strong point is its ability to leverage resources, funding, facilities and in kind assistance. Training and transitioning over 100 of the city's worst offenders is not inexpensive. To supplement income from recycling, Recycleforce has received city, state, and national support, including a \$5.6M grant from the Department of Labor to study recidivism. Other support has come from Community Crime Prevention Grants, Kellogg Foundation, and local family foundation grants. Financial assistance is leveraged with in-kind services from local partners. In-kind assistance is key to the survival of Recycleforce. # **Program sustainability**

Entrepreneurial relationships provide the benefits of creating community jobs with support coming from local business activity. RecycleForce.org is an environmental training nonprofit organization that

provides training and employment opportunities for ex-offenders and unemployed community residents. The combination of for profit and not for profit organizational structures enables financial and in-kind contributions to a job training program with limited resources. The one-two combination increases EWDJT leveraging, promotes sustainability and provides a needed community service. Much like a Community Development Corporation, RecycleForce has the potential for using a for profit enterprise along with governmental and philanthropic assistance to sustain its environmental workforce program.

# Five EPA grantees provide technical support to following types of Brownfields grants.

- Assessment Grants provide funding for brownfield inventories, planning, environmental assessments, and community outreach.
- Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Grants provide funding to capitalize loans that are used to clean up brownfield sites.
- Cleanup Grants provide funding to carry out cleanup activities at brownfield sites owned by the applicant.
- Multipurpose (MP) Grants provide funding to conduct a range of eligible assessment and cleanup activities at one or more brownfield sites in a target area.
- Area-Wide Planning Grants provide funding to communities to research, plan and develop implementation strategies for cleaning up and revitalizing a specific area affected by one or more brownfield sites.

**NIEHS Hazardous Materials Worker Health and Safety Training** 

Letter of Intent Receipt Date: October 21, 2019 Application Receipt Date: November 21, 2019

NIEHS invites applications for cooperative agreements to support the development of model programs for the training and education of workers engaged in activities related to hazardous materials and waste generation, removal, containment, transportation and emergency response. This funding opportunity announcement aims to prevent work-related harm through safety and health training. The training programs will transmit skills and knowledge to workers in how best to protect themselves and their communities from exposure to hazardous materials encountered during hazardous waste operations, hazardous materials transportation, environmental restoration of contaminated facilities or chemical emergency response. A variety of sites, such as those involved with chemical waste cleanup and remedial action and transportation-related chemical emergency response, may pose severe health and safety concerns to workers and the surrounding communities. These sites contain many hazardous substances, sometimes unknown, and often a site is uncontrolled. A major goal of the Worker Training Program (WTP) is to support institutional competency-building for the development and delivery of model training and education programs.

### **Guide to Finding Federal Assistance and Resources for Environmental Justice Efforts**

This EPA guide offers general guidance and tips on searching for funding opportunities, as well as information on tools, trainings and other relevant resources that are available to help address community needs. The Federal Interagency Working Group on Environmental Justice (EJ IWG) includes several federal agencies and White House offices that increase local community capacity to promote and implement innovative and comprehensive solutions to environmental justice issues.

# **Eileen Fisher - SUPPORTING WOMEN IN ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE**

"We believe that a future with inclusive, equitable and sustainable systems for all people depends on deepening the connection between women's rights and environmental justice. After extensive research, we have designed a grant program to address the fact that, globally, women and girls are the most vulnerable to climate change and hold the firsthand experience to solve it. Linking these two issues not only feels like a natural next step for our company, it is essential to accelerate progress towards improving the status and rights of women and the health of our planet.

Beginning in 2019, we will award \$200,000 annually in amounts ranging from \$5,000 to \$30,000. Applicants must align with one or more of these key points:

- 1. Increasing women's participation in decision-making. Nonprofits and applicable programs are not required to have an explicit environmental focus, but they must be able to demonstrate how their program creates positive environmental outcomes.
- 2. Training women and girls in climate change adaptation, mitigation and advocacy. Nonprofits and applicable programs must provide women and girls with knowledge, tools and access to contribute to climate change resiliency and/or advocate for improved climate change policies.
- 3. Engaging women in the sustainable economy. Nonprofits and applicable programs must create opportunities for women to pursue livelihoods that elevate them as leaders in environmental solutions while improving their well-being and that of the planet.

# Eligibility

Organizations must meet the following criteria to be eligible to apply:

- Be an IRS-recognized 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization\*
- Provide direct services
- Address one or more of the above key points
- Program's mission focuses primarily on individuals who identify as female
- Executive leadership reflects the demographics of the program's beneficiaries
- Program has been generated by and/or co-designed with the communities it serves
- Able to provide financial statements for one full year of operations
- Able to complete an application and participate in an interview in English

### Research to build resilience in vulnerable communities.

Applications deadline: September 26, 2019.

The <u>funded research activities under this announcement</u> are intended to build better resilience in vulnerable communities against issues such as chemical contaminants, natural disasters and changing environmental conditions.

# **National Trust Preservation Funds**

# **Deadline: October 1**

Grants from National Trust Preservation Funds (NTPF) are intended to encourage preservation at the local level by providing seed money for preservation projects. These grants help stimulate public discussion, enable local groups to gain the technical expertise needed for particular projects, introduce the public to preservation concepts and techniques, and encourage financial participation by the private sector.

<sup>\*</sup>While organizations must be IRS-recognized 501(c)(3) nonprofits, there is no geographic restriction on the programs for which they are applying.

# EPA FY 2020 Brownfields Cleanup, Assessment and Revolving Loan Fund grants Grant Competition Application submission deadline December 3<sup>rd</sup>.

We encourage current and prospective EWDJT grantees to coordinate with assessment and cleanup grantees as they work with the same communities and stakeholders as workforce development grantees. Applicants that were selected for an FY19 Multipurpose Grant may not apply for an FY20. 

### 9. FY20 EWDJT TIMELINE

The timeline for each individual grant will depend on the official award date. A hypothetical schedule based on currently available information might look like the time line presented below. Let's assume a grant is announced in November. The FY20 EWDJT grant would extend from the official start date for three years. The first two years would focus on program development and delivery with a final year for additional training, placement, tracking, and program sustainability efforts. The work schedule might look like this:

# **October-November 2019**

- Twenty funding awards announced –After the new fiscal year begins (may slip into November)
- Award letter and acceptance by applicant

# **November-December 2019**

Work plans reviewed and approved

- Terms and Conditions finalized
- Funding authorized
- Official notice that funds are available for spending
- Program planning and preparation for the first cohort under the new grant
- Post award meetings with Advisory Board, partners, instructors and community stakeholders
- All-Grantee Meeting December 10<sup>th</sup>
- National Brownfields Conference December 11-13<sup>th</sup>

# January-March 2020

- Community awareness, program development, and marketing continues
- Quarterly and ACRES reporting due every quarter
- Leveraged services for program participants confirmed
- Recruitment and student assessment for initial training cohorts
- Training begins

# April - July 2020

- Community awareness, recruitment and student assessment continues
- First cohort graduation and placement in full swing
- Quarterly and ACRES reporting due every quarter
- Training continues, curriculum review based on student feedback and assessments

# **July 2020 – November 2021**

- Placement, community awareness, recruitment, and student assessment continues
- Training continues, revisions to curriculum if necessary
- Annual All-Grantee Meetings with idea exchange, leveraging and placement opportunities
- Anticipation and preparation for the next EWDJT funding cycle
- Search for additional support and backstop funding for program sustainability

### November 2021 – November 2022

- Last year of the grant, training windup placement, tracking
- Continued search for Federal and local funding for program expansion
