The GreatEST Institute

OSHA Health and Safety Instructor Training

The Community College Consortium for Health and Safety Training (CCCHST)

Instructors are prepared through a 10-day Train-the-Trainer Program called the GreatEST Institute (Great Environmental Safety Training Institute) to deliver required certifications for public and private responders and workers including:

- 40-hour Waste Site Worker Health and Safety
- 24-hour Industrial Emergency Response
- DOT Haz Mat Awareness
- Confined Space Non-Entry Rescue
- Hazard Awareness and Communication
- Disaster Site Worker Awareness

Instructors use CCCHST curriculum to train workers and responders in their local area and report to PETE the number of courses they provide, for which they are provided a small reimbursement. PETE reports these numbers to NIEHS. CCCHST members may charge for the courses offered in their local area. Instructors reporting numbers may return at least every two years for Instructor Refresher training offered at colleges across the nation.

CCCHST is sponsored by the Partnership for Environmental Technology Education (PETE) headquartered in South Portland, Maine. PETE is one of twenty-two affiliated councils of the 1,150-member American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) and the only council whose core mission is environmental, health, safety and security training. PETE network of community, technical, U.S. territory and tribal college members for whom PETE

provides faculty development programs, workshops, and institutes. This program is supported with grant funding from the National Institute for Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS).

20 scholarships covering travel, tuition, lodging and some meals are available from PETE.

4. Federal environmental initiatives that will impact EPA JT programs

It is still early to see the impact of current Federal environmental initiatives will have on the EPA Job Training (JT) Program. It is however important that JT grant recipients and stakeholders be informed on the progress of these government wide initiatives. Today we discussed three initiatives and their relationship to the JT Program. Each of these programs are vastly different but share similar goals associated with expanding job development in underserved communities and will directly or indirectly affect JT grant recipients in the coming year.

- Justice 40
- EPA office of Environmental justice
- The infrastructure investment and Jobs Act

Justice40

For EPA JT grant recipients, furthering environmental justice has always been a primary objective of their program. Four months after President Biden's executive order the Chair of the Council on Environmental Quality, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and the National Climate Advisor, in consultation with the Advisory Council, jointly published recommendations on how certain Federal investments might be made toward a goal that 40 percent of the overall benefits associated with climate change and clean energy flow to disadvantaged communities. Recommendations focused on the following investments.

- Clean energy and energy efficiency
- Clean transit
- Affordable sustainable housing
- Training and workforce development
- Remediation and reduction of legacy pollution
- Development of critical clean water infrastructure

Recommendations reflect existing authorities' agencies have for achieving the 40-percent goal as well as recommendations on any legislation needed to achieve the 40-percent goal. Currently, appropriations are not attached to the Justice40 executive order. While the White House Environmental Justice Advisory Council report involves EPA in many of the recommended actions, worker training associated with Justice40 currently falls into the purview of Health and Human Services (HHS) with two pilot programs recommended. One such pilot program is the responsibility of the NIEHS Environmental Career Worker Training Program (ECWTP). The White House Environmental Justice Advisory Council report recommended NIEHS initiate the following activities.

- Increase funding for the NIEHS Environmental Career Worker Training Program.
- Expand this program to provide grants to support nonprofits, labor, academic institutions, etc. in establishing worker training programs.
- Prepare unemployed and underemployed people for careers in renewable solar and wind energy infrastructure, installment, and maintenance, as well as green infrastructure development and maintenance for community resilience, flood mitigation, and storm surge defense.

- Grant program for non-profits, labor, health and safety organizations, and academic institutions to workers for occupations in environmental cleanup and restoration, disaster and emergency response, critical facilities maintenance and operation, construction, etc.
- Include training tailored for unemployed and underemployed individuals and non-English speakers.

Several EPA Job Training grant recipients have grants under the Environmental Career Worker Training Program or partner with those programs. While organizations working with ECWTP cannot duplicate Federal assistance they can benefit from like-minded programs addressing different community needs.

EPA's Office of Environmental Justice

The current Director of the Office of Environmental Justice is Matthew Tejada. A primary goal of his office is to support and empower communities as they develop and implement solutions that significantly address environmental and/or public health issues at the local level. This includes networking with EPA resources, such as technical assistance grants, mapping tools, and awareness materials that provide communities with additional means to build capacity and effectively participate in local decision-making opportunities. EPA's Office of Environmental Justice facilitates a [National Environmental Justice Community Engagement Calls](#), to discuss and receive feedback on all aspects of EJ at EPA, their partners, and communities. ZOOM meetings not only serve as an opportunity to give an update on EPA's EJ work and its resources, but also to listen and learn from communities, partners, and stakeholders. Additionally, the monthly community engagement calls speak to the agency's commitment to [Justice40](#), Section 7 of these notes announces the next Community Engagement Call scheduled for February 22nd to discuss the EJ Mapping Tool. While the EPA Office of Environmental Justice does not currently have funding available, grant opportunities are likely to become available with the new budget.

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

November 6th, 2021, the President signed the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

The infrastructure law provides \$550 billion in new spending over 5 years in addition to traditional budget allocations. With passage of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and the Justice40 executive order, environmental justice has become a new priority among a number of Federal agencies. Over the next 5 years, examples of initiatives that will impact EPA from passage of this law include the following expenditures.

- \$21.0 – billion to clean up brownfield and superfund sites, reclaim abandoned mine lands, and plug orphan oil and gas wells
 - \$15.0 - billion for lead service line replacement
 - \$23.4 - billion for the bipartisan Drinking Water and Wastewater Infrastructure Act of 2021
 - \$10.0 - billion to address Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS)
 - \$3.5 - billion (\$1.8 billion under Water Infrastructure and \$1.7 billion under Resiliency) for the Indian Health Service Sanitation Facilities Construction program
 - \$8.3 - billion for Bureau of Reclamation western water infrastructure
 - \$15.5 - billion for greenhouse gas reduction
 - \$5.0 - billion for climate justice projects
 - \$2.5 - billion for abandoned mine cleanup
 - \$47.2 - billion for cybersecurity to address critical infrastructure needs, waste management, flood, and wildfire mitigation
 - Additional funding for other environmental related projects including workforce development

5. Announced opportunities for JT graduates created by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act

Over the past few months, Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Administrator Michael Regan has issued a letter to Governors outlining the key priorities for water investments, including targeting resources to disadvantaged communities, making rapid progress on lead-free water for all, and tackling dangerous chemicals such as PFAS. Additionally other agencies have announced funding for new initiatives that will impact EPA Job Training programs in the coming years.

- EPA announced \$7.4 billion in funding allocations for states to upgrade America's aging water infrastructure, sewerage systems, pipes and service lines, and more.
- EPA is announcing that it will allocate \$2.9 billion in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding to states, Tribes, and territories for lead service line replacement in 2022. The 2022 allocation is the first of five years of nearly \$15 billion in dedicated EPA funding for lead service lines that states will receive through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.
- EPA announced \$1 billion in funding to clean up 49 Superfund sites across 24 states to accelerate cleanup at dozens of other sites across the country, stop toxic waste from harming communities, and create good-paying jobs.
- DOE established the new Office of Clean Energy Demonstrations, which will oversee \$20 billion of infrastructure funding to scale up clean energy, and reduce pollution while benefiting underserved communities.
- DOI announced that the Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement (OSMRE) is extending the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Fund program through 2034. This extension will provide for continued funding to states and Tribes for reclaiming hazardous abandoned mines, replacing polluted water supplies, and reducing legacy pollution in coalfield communities.
- Awarding Grants to Protect Children and Families from Lead Paint and Home Health Hazards: The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has awarded nearly \$13.2 million to state and local government agencies through its Lead Based Paint Hazard Reduction (LBPHR) program. LBPHR identifies and cleans up dangerous lead in low-income households, in addition to other health and safety hazards in homes.

U.S. EPA Releases Draft Environmental Justice Action Plan for Land Protection and Cleanup Programs

U.S. EPA's office of Land and Emergency Management released a new Environmental Justice Action Plan on January 5 as part of a whole-of-government and EPA-wide effort to address the nation's environmental justice challenges.

The plan outlines objectives to strengthen compliance with cornerstone environmental statutes and civil rights laws, incorporate environmental justice considerations, improve community engagement, and provide benefits to underserved communities in land pollution prevention and cleanup programs.

For the brownfields community, these plans include promotion of the use of environmental justice analyses ([EJSCREEN](#)) for brownfield grant applicants and goals to reach out to more brownfields communities facing environmental justice issues.


